ISSUES RAISED BY PARISHIONERS

A number of issues have been raised by parishioners since the publication of the last newsletter.



Dog Fouling.

Concern has been expressed at dog fouling in the parish, particularly at Terrace Lane Recreation ground which is subject to a Public Spaces Protection Order. The council does provide dog waste bins and dog poo gloves in several places to encourage dog owners to clean up after their pets and would like to thank the majority of those who do so. It is regrettable that there is still a minority of irresponsible owners who do not.

Noise.

Do we consider how noisy we are? Are we noisy neighbours? Do you have a gate or fence panel that bangs in windy weather? The weather and hours of daylight over the next few months mean that we will be spending less time in our gardens and consequently the issue of noise becomes less of a problem than it is in the summer months. Perhaps now is a time for some reflection. Listening to music whilst sitting in your garden is fine, but what about the volume levels?



It's good to have family and friends around for social evenings, perhaps with a barbeque outside. What is an appropriate time to wind things up?

Speeding Vehicles

Concern is still being expressed at the speed of traffic along Newboundmill Lane and through New Houghton. As mentioned in previous newsletters, the parish council is eager to renew its involvement with Community Speed Watch and a Community Speed Watch training event has been arranged for those who want to be involved.



Participation in the CSW scheme is a useful way of gathering evidence for the need of traffic calming measures such as the flashing speed signs that are on Chesterfield Road North, Pleasley Hill.

The training session with PSPO Shaun Woodcock the Derbyshire Constabulary Speed Watch Co-ordinator, which will last about two hours, will be at The Verney Institute on Monday November 20th at 6pm. The council hopes that there will be a big turnout because the greater the number of volunteers, the less time each individual needs to give.

It’s not often that an evening finishes with a conga!



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CENSUS OF ENGLAND AND WALES, 1871.

Superintendent Registrar's District Manfield Enumeration District, No. 1

DESCRIPTION OF ENUMERATION DISTRICT.

As everyone must know by now, Pleasley Pit Trust is celebrating the 150th year of the sinking of Pleasley Colliery. So, what was our parish like before 1873 and what effect did the pit have on the area?

The census of April 2nd 1871 for Pleasley comprised Pleasley Village, Pleasley Lodge, Pleasley Park, Pleasley Vale Works, Stuffingwood, Littlewood, Warsop Park, Carter Lane, Shirebrook Village and part of Stoney Houghton.

In Pleasley Village there were just 27 properties including the Nag's Head and the Rectory. Just three roads were named: Chesterfield Road, Teversal Road (now Newboundmill Lane) and Church Street. The population was 149, 84 males and 65 females.

The hamlet of Stoney Houghton had 19 properties with 40 males and 27 females. Employment in both areas was predominantly in agriculture. 64 people lived at Pleasley Vale Works with equal numbers of men and women. **There is no mention of New Houghton.**

Ten years later, eight years after the sinking of the pit, the situation was very different. According to the census of 1881, not only was the colliery working but a railway was being built as well. 64 people (male 52, female 12) were living in four huts for railway workers at Upper Pleasley. Two roads at Upper Pleasley

are mentioned, Nightingale and Florence and most of the adult male occupants were employed at the colliery. There were 132 people living in 38 houses in this area of Upper Pleasley.

Pleasley Village had a population of 194 in 33 houses. Several occupations were mentioned but still most were employed in agriculture, some at the pit and some (mostly women) at the mills. Stoney Houghton had 14 houses with 38 men and 33 women, mostly involved in agriculture.

The big change from 1871 to 1881 is the mention of New Houghton for the first time in a census. There were 20 houses with 117 occupants. This was a mixed population of men and their families who moved to work at the mine, some from Shropshire and Staffordshire but most from other mining areas in Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire. Of the 20 heads of household, all male, only three were above the age 35, two of them in their 50s. All the adult women were housewives with the exception of one 19-year-old who was unemployed.

The average age of the heads of household was 32. Of the 117 occupants 66 were children.

Surnames of householders were: Beal, Neale, Henson/Henton, Darby, Pearce, Pedley, Slaney, Jones (2 families), Busby, Cox, Etwell/Elwell, Dunn? Parker, Farmer, Marriott, Hand, White, Seals, Wells, and Wilson.

Are you a direct descendant of these "founding fathers"? Let us know. Do you have photographs?


